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WASHINGTON LETTER

Approach of Sixtieth Session of Congress.

MESSAGE EXCITES INTEREST

Probable Contents of Chief Executive's Communication to Congress—May Suggest Repeal of Sherman Law—Will Recommend Preservation of Congress.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—As the date for the assembling of the Sixtieth Congress approaches, interest in the probable contents of the President's message becomes more keen. In fact, the topic just now is overshadowing everything else political.

In general it is understood that the President will have something further to say upon the subject of railroad regulation, but just what his recommendations on this subject will be, even those who have talked with Mr. Roosevelt recently are not at all certain. Some months ago it was believed that a sweeping extension of the powers of the Interstate Commerce Commission would be advocated, but of late there has been a growing feeling that the message would be likely to confine itself to recommendations for strengthening the existing law. There are those who would not be surprised if the message recommended the repeal of the Sherman law, or its amendment, in such particulars as would inaugurate an entirely new plan of controlling trusts and corporations.

It is accepted as a foregone conclusion in well informed circles here also that a section of the message will be devoted to an explanation in defence of the plan for sending the battleship fleet to the Pacific. Another subject which will undoubtedly occupy a considerable amount of space in the message is that of the desirability of adopting a definite and energetic policy of water improvements including the preservation of

the forests as the conservators of the water supply. This is subject for which the President is full of enthusiasm.

While he has long been a firm believer in the improvements of rivers and harbors of the country by the nation, his recent journey down the Mississippi was a revelation to him. In his talks with governors of the various western states, and other enthusiastic supporters of a broad and liberal policy of waterway improvements—like Congressman Ransdell of Louisiana—he has learned that the average cost of water transportation upon improved waterways is less than one-sixth that of rail transportation, and he has come to accept the belief that the improvement of the waterways of the country will prove the most effective possible form of rate regulation and prevent freight congestion on the great railways of the country.

It is well known that the President does not do anything half-heartedly. Having interested himself in the subject of improving the nation's waterways, he undoubtedly will follow it up with great energy. Except for his announced determination to make no more addresses to conventions in Washington, it is believed that he would ask a stirring speech at the fourth annual convention of the National Rivers & Harbors Congress which is to assemble in this city December 4, 5 and 6, and it is said that he is strongly tempted to make an exception in this case. It is more likely, however, that he will designate one of the cabinet officers to represent him on that occasion.

The President comes from a state which for nearly a century has followed the policy of improving its waterways. In a sense he regards himself as the father of the Panama Canal, and he feels that the inauguration of a broad policy of waterway improvements may prove his most enduring claim to the consideration and remembrance of generations to come.

PASSED BAD CHECKS

Police Are Looking for Noted Kansas Man.

WOMAN CLAIMS TO BE VICTIM

Sylvester Harrison Wanted for Working a Real Estate Scheme and for Passing Spurious Bank Paper—Draws Currency of \$40,000 and Carries Same in Grip.

WICHITA, Kas., Oct. 25.—Sylvester, a noted character of Southern Kansas, is missing from the city and charges have been filed against him in the Sedgewick County Court by Mrs. Katie Cathers, in which she alleges that he has with him \$10,000 of her money, secured from her in what she claims was a clever real estate swindle. Harrison is a rich retired farmer, inheriting over \$50,000 from his wife. He drew out of the local banks something like \$20,000 and with the \$10,000 drawn out of the National Commerce Bank on a check signed by Mrs. Cathers, he left the city.

Charles Carrey, cashier of the National Commerce Bank saw Harrison place the \$10,000 in currency in a grip. At the Fourth National Bank he drew \$2500, placing it in the grip also. Three other banks report similar drafts from them, the money being placed in the grip. The

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telegraph and telephone wires are being used in every direction in order to get trace of Harrison. He stated to a local newspaperman that he had a scheme to clean up \$10,000. Beside the charge of embezzlement of the \$10,000 from Mrs. Cathers, Harrison is also charged with passing spurious checks aggregating over a thousand dollars.

The accused was shot through the head at Bonesteel, S. D., during the land opening at that place, and since that time has been tried for insanity, but found sane. In these proceedings his only son was taken from his care by order of the probate judge.

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
