BRYAN AND CHANLER

Politicians Speculating as to the Conference.

DEMOCRATS MAY NOMINATE

Lieutenant-Governor of New York May be Named as Presidential Nominee—David Belasco a Wizard in Theatrical Detail—Hammerstein's Versatility.

New York, Oct. 30.—The ancient enmity between F. Augustus Heinze and Henry H. Rogers has left a trail of crime and financial debauchery that extends from Butte, Montana, to Hamburg, Germany, thus far, and may have in the immediate future many other far-reaching effects of a disastrous character. Thousands of innocent depositors and business interests in no way related to the schemes and ambitions of these men have suffered grievously, and many thousands more apt to suffer before the end is reached, though at this writing it seems that Heinze is "down and out." He and the other stormy petrel of finance, C. W. Morse, have been forced to withdraw from all banks and financial institutions with which they were connected, and only by the prompt action of the combined banking interests of New York, was a cataclysm averted that would have shaken the whole nation.

Politicians are speculating on what affect Mr. Bryan's visit to New York is apt to have on the Chanler boom. The consensus of opinion seems to be that it will help it. Indeed the theory is advanced by a political wiseacre that one of the purposes of Mr. Bryan in coming thither just at this time, was to find out for himself how the young Lieutenant Governor is regarded by the party leaders in the East. If so, he must have been favorably impressed, as all the New York papers were full of Chanler talk the very morning that the Peerless one arrived.

That there was more in the Chanler boom than would appear from surface indications was confided to me by a prominent up-state democrat six weeks ago. Since then, friends of the Lieutenant Governor have been at work quietly but industriously sounding sentiment in different parts of the country, and have been much impressed with the result. Everywhere they declare they have found an inclination on the parts of Democrats to return to the old party principles, which were submerged in the flood of radicalism that followed the first nomination of Mr. Bryan and paved the way for the propaganda conducted in these latter days by William R. Hearst.

They declare that not only would Mr. Chanler be a fitting standard bearer in a Democratic fight along the lines of conservative reform, but that with him as the nominee Mr. Hearst, who they believe undoubtedly will figure in the next Presidential campaign, would be deprived of much political ammunition that he might use with advantage against almost any other Democratic candidate. Mr. Hearst, in the gubernatorial campaign a year ago, and the Independence League leader at that time, almost exhausted the vocabulary of praise in his efforts to boost Mr. Chandler.

It is the plan of the Chanler managers to name Governor Johnson, of Minnesota as the New York's running mate, a plan that is much criticized by practical politicians, by the way, as indicating an amateurish hand in the Chanler management. No candidate for a Presidential nomination, these wise ones say, can afford to antagonize all other aspirants by selecting one particular man this far in advance.
