## SENDS BILL TO FISH COMMISSION

R. D. HUME CLAIMS THAT THE STATE OWES HIM \$2,700 AS HIS PART OF LICENSE MONEY FOR OPERATING HATCHERY.

Master Fish Warden H. G. Van Dusen is in receipt of a letter from R. D. Hume, a large canner of Rogue River, and who has been operating a private hatchery in the river, enclosing a statement of the cost and maintenance of the hatchery since 1901, and also a bill for his part of the license money which has been collected since 1901.

Section 4081, of the Bellinger and Cotton Code, provides that the fish commissioners shall pay to any person or corporation, who maintains a private hatchery, a sum not to exceed 60 per cent of license moneys collected by the Board from persons engaged in fishing or packing fish. The sum which the Board has received from such licenses is \$4325.18, and Mr. Hume claims he is entitled to 60 per cent of such sum or \$2595.10.

The matter will be brought before the Fish Commissioners on Tuesday next and is going to cause some discussion in that body as no moneys are available to pay commissions that have run over several years, as it is the policy of the Commission to invest such money, as may be a surplus at the end of the fiscal year, in making permanent improvements in the hatcheries under the maintenance of the Board.

The matter is altogether a peculiar one. Hume has been operating a hatchery on the Rogue River and its tributaries for about six years, and in that time he claims to have spent \$20,000.48. He has never given the Fish Commission official notice as to the operation of the hatchery and up to the present time has never put in a claim for his pro rata of the license money.

For a couple of years past Mr. Hume has defied the law and refused to pay a license to operate his cannery. He was brought into court last August and was convicted by a jury and fined \$500 and costs. He is still operating the cannery without a license and may be brought before the court during its next session.

Hume is said to be an enthusiast in the matter of the propagation of salmon and with his hatcheries has undoubtedly done good work, but it is thought that his action in asking for reimbursement at this time, is the result of a soreness against the state com-


