GIVES OPINION. Customs Official Clears Misunderstanding Regarding German Agreement.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Speaking at the annual conference of local appraisers, in session here, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury James B. Reynolds, just back from a special tariff inquiry in Europe, took the opportunity to clear up for the benefit of the appraisers a great deal of the existing misunderstanding about the German agreement.

Besides the official expression of opinion to the appraisers Mr. Reynolds in an interview later said the administration had always regarded the treaty as nothing more or less than an interpretation of the customs administrative act; and that the view accepted in some quarters that the agreement is a series of special concessions to Germany, is entirely erroneous.

INCREASE PRIZES.

Coney Island Jockey Club Adds to the Value of Purse

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Announcement is made by the Coney Island Jockey Club of substantial increases in added money in almost all the stake events decided at the Sheephead race track, starting with the raising of the guaranteed value of the suburban handicap, considered the foremost turf event in the country, to \$25,000.

This increased liberality, it is stated, is an acknowledgment of the splendid success of the season that is now closing and bespeaks a willingness to share the profits that have been reaped with the owners of horses.

The announcement of the Coney Island Jockey Club was accompanied by one of similar purport from the Gravesend management, stating that henceforth the guaranteed value of the Brooklyn handicap also will be \$25,000.
