

**MARINE MEMORANDA**

**Norwester in Full Possession of Bar and Harbor.**

**ROANOKE FAILS TO GET OUT**

**New Coast Opposition Line of Steamers—Mackinaw Released on Libel Bond—City of Panama Due In—Numantia Due From China—Other Dock Notes.**

The British steamship Glenstrae, Captain McGillivray, went on to the metropolis yesterday morning at 9 o'clock. She will load wheat out for trans-Pacific delivery.

The O. R. & N. steamer Oklahoma went back to Portland early yesterday morning, picking up the British ships Wavertree and Miltonburn at Brookfield, en route.

The steamship City of Panama was due last evening from San Francisco, loaded with freight for Portland, but the riotous condition of the Columbia bar probably deterred her from coming in. She is expected at the O. R. & N. docks this morning.

The big P. & A. steamship Numantia is due in this port from Hong Kong some time today, with a cargo valued at over half a million in gold. She will have been 19 days on the voyage today.

It is said the steamers F. A. Kilburn and Hanalei are to be put on the Portland, Astoria, San Francisco, Los Angeles run in opposition to the Roanoke and Elder, owing to a falling out as between the owning companies of the several craft.

Harry Blessing, the well known Kamm representative in this city, has successfully passed the examination for the post of customs inspector, which he lately took at the custom house here, and his friends are ready to congratulate him, if he needs anything of the kind.

Captain Christiansen, of the German bark Schurbek, just in from Valparaiso,

reports that the British barks Castor and Largo Bay, both bound for this port, are behind him somewhere, the former having left Valparaiso two weeks ahead of the Schurbek, and the latter on the same day and in his company.

The steamship Senator stole a march on the Morning Astorian, having entered port, docked, and left up for Portland, after this paper had given up her arrival until yesterday morning. Once is enough of that kind of thing and our marine man proposes to keep cases on her hereafter.

The steamship Mackinaw, which has been anchored in this harbor for the past seven days by virtue of a libel process sworn out in the federal court at Portland, and involving a claim of \$10,000, was released on bond yesterday morning, and went below to be in readiness for a passable bar, and then to hustle on to the Bay City with her big cargo of wheat.

The bar tugs Tatoosh and Wallula were both down at the entrance yesterday and found things generally in such shape as to dispense with their services for the day at least. They returned to their berths at the O. R. & N. pier; but as soon as the fleet of barges lining the Fort Stevens dock is cleared out, they will alternate there for night docking.

The steamship Roanoke came down from Portland yesterday morning and tied up to the Callender pier long enough to take on about 100 tons of freight, for San Francisco and Los Angeles, and then she went below to tackle the Columbia bar in all its turbulence. Captain Dunham surveyed things to his heart's content, and he straightway came back to the Callender, where after an hour's wrestling with the gale and tide he secured his fine ship, to wait for a lull. It may be said in passing that when Captain Dunham and the Roanoke will not pass the bar, nothing much in the sea-going line is likely to try it. She will get away this morning if things lighten up a bit.

Yesterday was one long howling sou'wester. It blew, and rained, and thundered, and lightninged, constantly, uproariously, until the whole community was soaked and deafened and blinded, while the umbrella brigade was conspicuously notable for the vast majority of "reversed arms" it was carrying around town.

The bay was a sheet of scud and flying foam and no local boats were out

that could by any means whatever remain at their moorings. Down by the sea and the bar, the tempest had things all its own way, and no craft tried issues with the pounding bar at all, either way. All masters were prone to make things snug and stay close to warm and windless spots, and the pace of the gale abated not from 30 miles an hour until the sun sank behind the grim gray barrier of clouds that swung to the north and east all day long.

The British steamer Woodford is due from up the river today.

The Norwegian steamer Aker is due down from the metropolis at any hour, wheat-laden, for the United Kingdom.

The Standard Oil Company's oil steamer, Colonel L. E. Drake, arrived down from Portland at 5 p. m. yesterday and en route to San Francisco.
