

WOMEN ARE PLIANT

Professor Would Do Away With Old Fashioned Ideas.

LIBERTY BELL FOR WIVES

Not a Good Thing For Wives to be Dependent Upon Husbands—Should Have Interests Separate—Says Men Like "House Dog" Kind of Women.

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—Suggestions for a declaration of independence among wives were made yesterday by Prof. Wm. I. Thomas of the University of Chicago, sociologist and author of "Sex and Society."

He would have the women put away the old fashioned ideal of complete devotion and intellectual surrender to their husbands interests, think for themselves, and have some kind of a clearing in the jungle of conjugal responsibilities in which they could stand on their own feet and be mistresses of all they surveyed.

Prof. Thomas expressed his ideas before the Chicago Women's Club in an address upon "The Future of Marriage."

After touching upon race suicide, women's slavery to fashion and the like, Prof. Thomas sounded the liberty bell for wives by saying "Still another ideal of marriage is a more varied set of interests for the wife. With the household as it is now made up, it is not psychologically a good thing for one person to be dependent upon the will of another and solely attached to his interests. No matter how perfectly a woman is educated in the schools, she will not keep pace with men unless she have some concerns for which she is primarily responsible."

"This does not amount to saying that she must be financially independent or a bread winner, though there is no objection to that. But her life demands some first hand reaction to the world, for the sake of her character and intelligence."

"Under the pressure of natural selection man made a tardy alliance with woman and the home in primitive times. He has used woman as a plaything, as a lay figure on which to hang his wealth; has bought her cheap and bought her dear, but he has really associated with her."

Prof. Thomas declared that the kind of wives men liked were of the house dog type, domestic animals, "docile, affectionate, friendly, unquestioning."

"And lending herself to this disposition," he said, "woman has been pliant."

Prof. Thomas declared many of the women best equipped for motherhood were leaving it, in their pursuits of fashion, to the lower and the defective classes.

MILK DEALERS COMBINE.

Evidence Found Plainly Showing a Criminal Combination.

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—The missing link of evidence sought by states attorney Healy to show a criminal combination among the big milk dealers was found by him yesterday in the form of a letter. It is the long missing letter in which the big firms made an effort to induce the small independent dealers to increase the price of milk previous to the uniform increase in prices made by the big corporations.

One sentence in the letter, which is signed by a representative of one of the largest firms in the city, is considered sufficient to convince a jury that the uniform increase in prices was not merely the result of chance.

"It might not be proper for your organization to take official action in increasing the price," said the letter, to the Chicago retail milk dealers Association, "but you may act independently in increasing the price with the assurance that the big dealers will follow your lead."
