## ON THE WATERFRONT

The Regular Grist of News of Vessels Moving.

### STEAMER ELDER ARRIVES IN

The Asuncion, Senator and Northland go to Sea—Daisy Freeman, Strathendrick and Washington Arrive in—Storm Bulletin Posted Yesterday.

The steamer Costa Rica left San Francisco on Sunday and is due here today.

The steamship Tiberius, grain laden, passed out on Sunday. She is bound for the United Kingdom, via Port Said.

The steamer George W. Elder, from

San Pedro and San Francisco, reached the Callender dock yesterday at 1 o'clock p. m. with a good lot of freight and a fine passenger list. After a short delay she proceeded on her way.

The British steamer Valeria came in yesterday at 10 a. m. and proceeded up the river at 4:45 p. m.

The City of Panama, arrived here yesterday at 3:15 p. m. and left up at 5 o'clock.

The American steamer Persia, from San Francisco, arrived yesterday afternoon at 3:30 and left for Portland where she will load a general cargo for the Orient.

The Northland came down the river yesterday, heavy laden with lumber and left out at 11 a. m. She carried 850,000 feet of lumber for San Francisco.

The French bark Buffon, Captain Ameline in command, was reported last night as being outside with pilot aboard.

The Buffon left Newcastle on October 13th consigned to Kerr, Gifford & Co., of Portland. She will load grain at that port.

The British steamer Strathendrick, in ballast, from San Francisco, arrived here at 8 a. m. Sunday, and passed up the river. She will load wheat at Portland for the United Kingdom.

The steam schooner Daisy Freeman arrived in at 8 a. m. Sunday.

The Standard Oil Company's steamer Asuncion came down the river at 6 p. m. on Sunday and passed out to sea yesterday at 7 a. m., for San Francisco.

The Americana which has been loading at Knappton, will sail today for Sidney, Australia, with 1,000,000 feet of lumber.

The following was posted at the Western Union office yesterday: Southeast storm warning, 6:40 p. m., Port Crescent, West Port Angeles, Blaine, Bellingham, Port Townsend, Everett, Seattle, Tacoma, Anacortes, Aberdeen, North Head, Astoria and Marshfield. Storm approaching Vancouver Island, moving east. Will cause high southeasterly winds during next 24 hours.

The Numantia, loaded with flour and machinery, will be due here this evening bound for Honolulu and way ports.

The French bark Armen sailed from San Francisco, for Portland, yesterday.

### PRAYERS OFFERED.

Churchmen Pray For Filibuster About to be Shot.

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—Prayers were offered in the First Presbyterian Church of Hackensack, N. J., yesterday, for the safety of George H. Vice, one of a party of filibusters captured in Brazil recently and sentenced to be shot. Vice lived in Hackensack where his mother still lives. Vice, with a number of other Americans and Canadians, joined Sebastian Magali who recruited a hundred men and then attempted to capture the State of Mines Geraes, Brazil. Brazilian troops captured the party. Mrs. Vice has appealed to the State Department to save the life of her son and diplomatic steps have been taken to investigate the case.

### ILLINOIS-CENTRAL CONTROL.

Final Clash Between Harriman and Fish Forces.

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.—On the eve of the final clash for control of the Illinois Central Railroad, President Harahan expressed confidence yesterday.

Today, the attorneys representing the Harriman-Harahan interests will appear before Judge Ball and ask that the earliest possible date be fixed for the hearing of arguments on the temporary injunction issued by Judge Ball, which caused the adjournment of the meeting of the stockholders and on the result of which control of the road apparently hinges.

"We expect that an almost immediate hearing will be granted" said President Harahan, "and the subject will be out of the way when the adjourned meeting is called on December 18."

It is believed that Wednesday will be fixed as the date for the hearing of the motion to dissolve the injunction. Attorney R. M. Shaw will represent the Harriman forces, and Attorney H. W. Leman will appear for the Fish faction.

If the case is decided before December 18 that date probably will determine the control of the railroad.

### INVESTIGATE TRUST COMPANIES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—The Brooklyn grand jury which, last week, investigated the affairs of the suspended Jenkins and Williamsburg Trust Companies, will make a report today and it is expected that several indictments will be handed down. Then the jury will take up the affairs of the Brooklyn Bank and the International Trust Company. It is expected that the grand jury will complete its investigation of banks this week and the district attorney then expects to rush to trial the cases of all those indicted.

### NOTED SCULPTOR ARRIVES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—Among the passengers on the liner Lusitania which arrived yesterday were two distinguished artists, George Wade and Ernest Moore. Mr. Wade is a sculptor who made a reputation by his statues of royal personages, and Mr. Moore is a painter of note. He brings with him a number of pictures which he will exhibit in Washington. He will be the guest of the British Ambassador.




