FAVORS INJUNCTION.

CHICAGO, Dec. 16.—E. R. Farrar, counsel for Stuyvesant Fish is in favor and others voting certain stock at the

annual meeting of the Illinois Central. Farrar asserted that the Charter Railroad Securities Company of New Jersey which holds stock which Harriman wants to vote contains the power and germ of monopoly in its worst form, and unlike the Northern Securities Company, which controlled two corporations, spreads wings over every state and territory in the union.

DECLARES LAW UNFAIR.

Declines to Pass Life Sentence on Burglar.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Charles Cory, who pleaded guilty of burglary, may escape a life sentence in the state prison because Judge Rosalsky declares unfair the law which makes sentence for life obligatory in the case of a fourth conviction for felony. Cory who turned state's evidence and testified against two confederates, admitted when called before the court for sentence that he had served three terms in prison for burglary. The law is mandatory in directing that under such circumstances a life sentence must be inflicted. Judge Rosal-

sky said the law was infamous and declined to pass the life sentence, saying that it would be necessary in such a case to specify in the indictment that a man was charged with a fourth offense under the law. Cory was remanded to the Tombs until the Judge can find some way to escape from pronouncing the extreme sentence.
