### Still Paying Money—

### Operation Performed—

Mrs. F. Pantillo underwent an operation for tumor, at the hospital yesterday, and considerable hopes are entertained for its success. Dr. Koljonen was the operating surgeon.

### Ladies' Guild Social—

Ladies' Guild of Grace Episcopal Church will hold an evening social at the residence of Mrs. Chas. S. Brown on Franklin avenue on Friday the 17th.

### United States Hatcheries—

The number of salmon eggs, of the Chinook species, taken at the various stations on the Columbia river for the season of 1907-8 were 20,048,100. The number taken at Rogue River stations were 7,800,470.

### Concert Postponed—

Owing to the illness of several members of the Norwegian Singing Society, the Greig memorial concert has been postponed until January 21st. Great preparations are being made for the event, and tickets are selling rapidly.

### Will Expert Books—

W. P. O'Brien, accountant for the Astoria Box Company, and Grover Utzinger, of the Astoria National Bank, have been appointed as experts to look over the books and accounts in the city auditor's office.

### Seamen's Entertainment Tonight—

A free entertainment will be held at the Seamen's Institute this evening, and everyone will be made welcome. These entertainments which are given for the special benefit of seamen and fishermen, are receiving the encouragement of Astoria's citizens, many attending the functions regularly.

A letter has been received by the Chamber of Commerce asking for a location and other essentials for a logging company which desires to start to work at once in this locality. ### Raising Wireless Masts—

The wireless telegraph company has decided to erect two masts, each 100 feet high and a gang of men are now at work. The first mast will probably be in place tomorrow or Monday and work will then be commenced on the second pole and its placing be hurried to completion. In about a week, it is thought, the station will again be in operation in full blast.

### Dies at Hospital—

Christian Burnsgard, a native of Norway, aged 68 years, succumbed to an attack of typhoid fever, at the hospital yesterday after an illness of several days. The deceased was a resident of Skamokawa, and a prominent farmer of that district. He is survived by a widow and two children. The remains were taken up to Skamokawa on the Lurline last evening.

### Admen's Convention—

Coe, the photographer, is preparing an album of photographs for the Chamber exhibition work at the Admen's convention to be held in Oakland on the 20th. The photographs will cover all the industries of importance in this locality including dairying, fruit growing, lumbering and fishing and will include all of the main buildings and sites of interests in Astoria. There are some good buildings here that are a credit to a city of this size.

### Would Start Manufactory—

A company desiring to manufacture cheese and start a milk-condensing plant has written to the Chamber of Commerce asking for the number of gallons of milk produced in this locality and for the names of parties who might be more or less interested. ## A VERY IMPRESSIVE INSTALLATION
