



SURPRISING DEVELOPMENTS

Expounded The Law On Subject Of Conspiracy Alleged Fencing And Statute Of Limitations.

Very Elaborate.

Not Alone That a Conspiracy Existed But That Defendant Had Intentionally Been a Party to it-Favorable to Prosecution is the Opinion.

PORTLAND, Feb. 7.-The case of John Hall, charged with conspiracy, gon. went to the jury at 10:30 tonight.

Judge Hunt in the United States LAP district court finished his charge and delivered into the hands of the jury] at half past 10 tonight the case of the government against John H. Hall, former United States district attorney for Oregon. Before the jury retired to deliberate, Judge Hunt ordered them, in case they arrived at an agreement tonight, to return a sealed verdict to be opened when the court re-convenes in the morning.

Judge Hunt's instructions were the PENNYPACKER IMPLICATED most elaborate ever given in a land fraud or conspiracy case. He lucidly expounded the law on the subject of conspiracy, on the illegal fencing of public lands and on the subject of the statute of limitations. In regard to conspiracy he charged that it remained with the jury to determine whether any conspiracy existed and whether there had been any overt acts in pursuance with this alleged conspiracy. 

MINE EXPLOSION.
