### LABOR UNIONS.

Gompers Requested to Call Convention to Nominate Federal Officers

NEW YORK, Feb. 10 .- At a meeting of the Federated Union held yesterday President Samuel Gompers of the American rederation of Labor, was requested by resolution to call a convention of labor union representatives from all over the country for the purpose of nominating candidates for president and vice-president of the United States, and adopting a platform for a national labor party The recent decision of the supreme court in which labor laws were declared unconstitutional, were criticised and it was declared that laboring men throughout the country must combine to change the constitution. Judges, it was said, owed their appointments to men opposed to labor and must be superseded before labor would receive the justice to which it is entitled.
