**Seamen's Institute
of Astoria.**

The Seamen's Institute in Astoria is the culmination of 28 years of faithful missionary work among seamen and fishermen in this port. The American Seamen's Friend Society has maintained a chaplain to seamen here since 1879. Rev. McCormac was then appointed chaplain, and labored faithfully scattering his seed in the form of kindly acts and words for 25 years. He resigned through old age two years ago, and last summer was summoned to receive his reward from his Master for a long and faithful service.

His memory is fragrant, and expressions of esteem are heard from far and near.

Rev. P. M. Ellefsen was appointed to succeed Father McCormac with instructions to provide an institute for seamen and fishermen, where they could find recreation, enjoyment and religious influence as a counter attraction to the questionable resorts of the town.

tion to the inducements offered by His was not an easy problem to solve. Property along the waterfront where such an institute ought to be located, was too high, and objections were made by many that Astoria had not enough of seamen to warrant such an undertaking. But the board in New York had faith in Astoria as a future seaport, and believed something could be done for the thousands of fishermen that come here every summer, and they insist on continuing their support. With this urging from the New York Society, and encouragement from many of the fishermen and leading citizens here, the work was started and an institute is an accomplished fact. There is yet much to do to make it complete, but patience and perseverance will yet make this institution a landmark and attraction to many a seaman and fisherman. A gasoline launch is operated in connection with the institute which gives the chaplain means to reach the ships anchored in the harbor, and to bring reading matter on board that is greatly appreciated both by officers and men. Five hundred magazines, 100

bundles of papers, 125 copies of gospels and Testaments, 12 comfort bags have been distributed on ships from the institute. Free lodgings has been given to 10 stranded sailors, with supper and breakfast added.

The Seamen's Friend Society of Astoria is an organized and incorporated body with 15 directors. Dr. Alfred Kinney is the president, and Rev. W. S. Gilbert, Rev. S. Short, Rev. G. E. Rydquist and Rev. C. C. Rarick, vice-presidents. The ship is well manned and bids fair to make a mark in the history of the port.

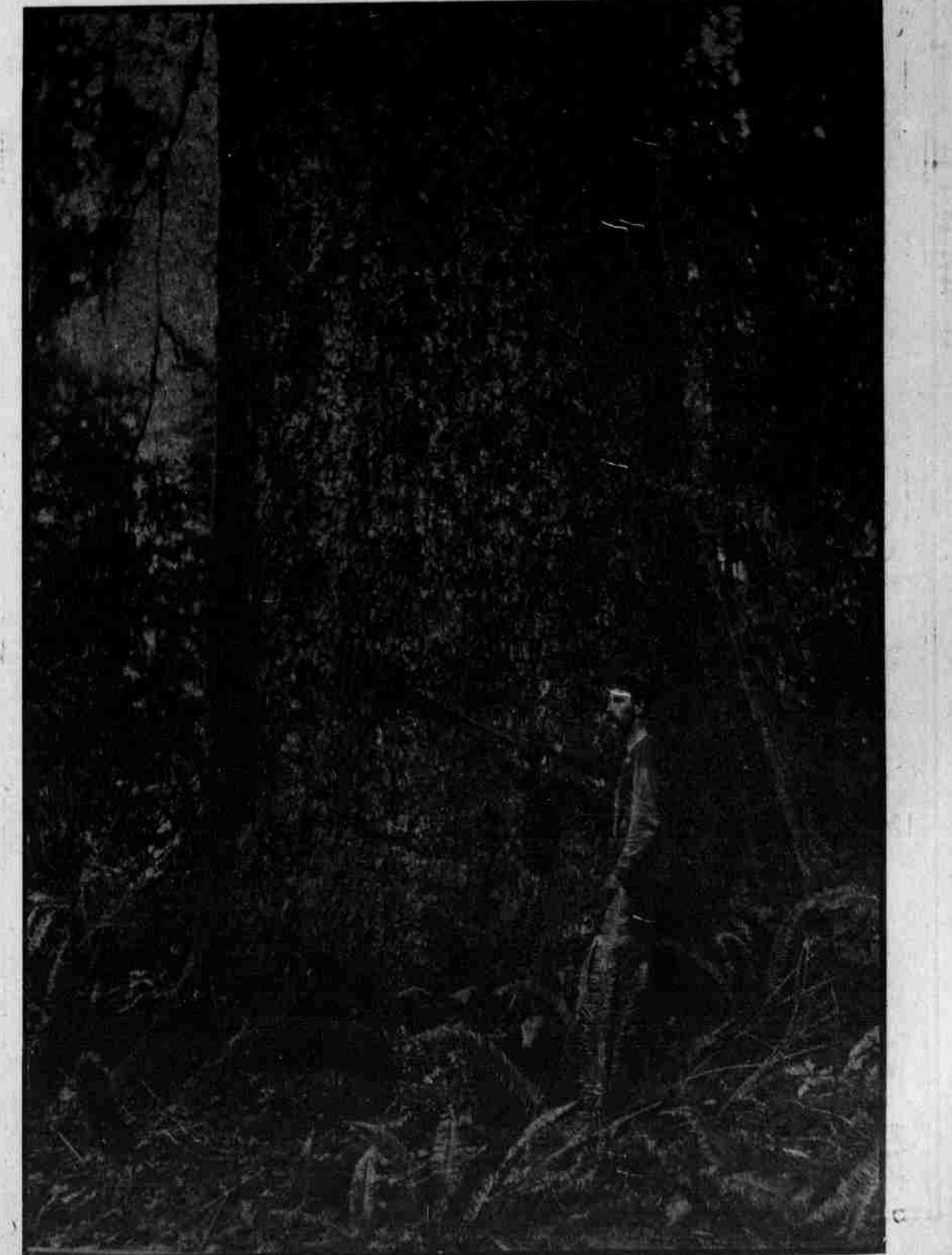
