

MARINE MEMORANDA

Largiemore Will Leave Part of Cargo in Astoria.

CROWN OF INDIA CROSSES IN

Steamship Strathblane Here to Load Lumber For China—German Ship Nal Loses One of Her Hooks—Washington in From Bay City.

The British ship Largiemore, Captain Spencer, will haul into the Sanborn dock at the foot of Ninth street and discharge 1600 tons of her cargo of Australian coal for G. W. Sanborn & Company. Her owners get 19 shillings the ton for freighting this coal across the Pacific, approximately \$4.75 per ton.

The British steamship Strathblane arrived in from San Francisco yesterday, and will go to the Tongue Point mill docks to load part cargo of lumber, for China; then on to Portland for that balance of her tonnage.

The steamer Washington was among the arrivals from San Francisco yesterday morning at 9 o'clock; and she went to the Calender pier where she discharged about 70 tons of freight of a general sort, and then went on to the metropolis. She had a fair list of passengers.

The schooner Alvena cleared from this port for San Francisco yesterday with 866,000 feet of lumber.

The fine new steamer Capistrano, of the Mission line, is due down from Portland on her maiden voyage to San Francisco, next Saturday.

The British bark Crown of India, Captain Gilbert, crossed in yesterday at 11 o'clock a. m., 149 days from Antwerp, and is now at anchor off the Tongue, awaiting towage to Portland. She had an uneventful trip out.

The British ship Verbena, Captain Lee, out from Callao since January 20 was reported outside the heads yesterday afternoon.

The German ship Nal lost one of her anchors shortly after she reached her anchorage at Tongue Point, and has had a force of men and boats hunting the big iron, as yet without success. She is biled to leave out for Queenstown with her cargo of wheat.

The fine tug Navigator, from San Francisco, with the oil barge Monterey on her hawsers, crossed in yesterday noon, under the pilotage of Captain Howes, and went on up the river to Portland without any delay.

The French bark Eduard Detaille went up to Portland yesterday morning on the lines of the Harvest Queen.

SECURING TAX REFORM.

CHICAGO, Mar. 3.—A Movement in the direction of securing tax reforms and measure of financial relief has been started by Mayor Busse. At the mayor's invitation the mayors of a score of Illinois cities will meet in Chicago tomorrow to discuss problems of taxation and municipal revenue. It will be a kind of heart to heart talk by Mayor Busse and controller Wilson with the heads of other municipalities on matters of common interest to all.

What the mayor and the controller would like to find out is why Chicago has so little spending money, although the tax rate is steadily going higher. According to the reports so far received the same, if not worse conditions existed in the finances of the larger cities throughout the state. The municipalities have a hard time making both ends meet. These conditions will be described in detail in the conference and then from a comparison of the results an attempt will be made to fix the blame and find the remedy.

It is more than likely that as a result of the meeting a movement for a thorough revision of the states tax system will be started.

PRIMARY REGISTRATION.

Nearly Doubly the Figures Recorded at This Time Two Years Ago.

CHARGED WITH ARSON

OAKLAND, Mar. 3.—Mrs. Esabella J. Martin was indicted by the grand jury yesterday on a charge of having dynamited the residence of Superior Judge Frank B. Ogden, in March, 1907. JAPANESE EMBEZZLERS.

Return to Japan and the Mikado put Them in Jail and Pays for Deposition.

SALT LAKE CITY, Mar. 3.—Because Utah did not have the money to bring back two embezzlers from Japan the Mikado's government not only tried and convicted the offenders for a crime in this state, but has paid Utah for collecting and forwarding affidavits in the case. A check for \$192 was received yesterday by Governor Cutler from the Japanese consul general. An accompanying letter said it was the desire of his government to look after the welfare of its citizens abroad and prosecute anyone who might bring dishonor upon the nationality.

The culprits fled from Brigham City, Utah, more than a year ago with \$16,000 entrusted to them for safe keeping by 75 Japanese laborers employed in the beet fields. The men were traced to Japan and there arrested immediately. Although the proceedings were abandoned owing to Utah's lack of funds the Japanese officials learned the particulars of the crime and requested the American authorities to forward the depositions of the victimized laborers.

DIFFICULTIES ADJUSTED.

CITY OF MEXICO, March 3.—Mexico and Guatemala have adjusted their diplomatic difficulties which have existed since the assassination here last April of Gen. Barillas, resulting in the demand for the extradition of Gen. Lime and Colonel Bone, and the removal of the Mexican legation to Salvador, upon Guatemala's refusal to grant Mexico's request. Heretofore one minister has been accredited to all five Central American states. The proximity of the two countries and the realization that the best interests of each would suffer by the continuation of the recent status is the reason assigned for the establishment of an independent legation. It is expected the Guatemalan government will soon name a minister to succeed Minister Aguerre who has returned to Guatemala to accept a cabinet position.

GLIDDEN CUP TOUR.

NEW YORK, Mar. 3.—Marked interest in the season's Glidden cup tour for automobiles was reported by members of the American Automobile Association's board of directors who arrived yesterday for their meeting to be held here to-day. Frank B. Powers, chairman of the touring board, here from Buffalo, in advance to discuss plans for the tour with several members of his committee, reports prospects of good representation not only of Eastern but of Western cars. Reports from New England also, he said, indicated that the leading clubs there will be well represented.

HURRYING PROMETHUS.

VALLEJO, Cal. Mar. 3.—In an endeavor to make a record for the Mare Island Navy Yard which will result in a battleship being constructed here, work on the collier Promethus, being built at the cost of \$1,550,000, is being rushed and will be completed by the construction and repair departments in ten months. During February over 120 tons of material were put in her every week, the progress made being 11 per cent. The ship is now over 36 per cent completed. She will be launched in eight months and finished two months thereafter. This will be the greatest record ever made in shipbuilding, either in a government or private yard.

INSURANCE COMPANY QUILTS.

DENVER, Mar. 3.—The injunction asked from the district court by the Maryland Casualty Company of Baltimore, preventing insurance commissioner E. R. Rittenhouse from carrying out his threat to refuse the company the right to do business in the state was withdrawn yesterday and notice given the commission that the company would, of its own volition, cease doing business in the state.

SPARKS RESIGNS.

RENO, Nev. Mar. 3.—T. F. Rowlands, for the past two years assistant superintendent of the Oregon Short Line at Sparks has resigned. He states that he gives up his work with the company after twenty years service for a needed rest. A successor has been appointed.
