### TABLE OF THE SEA.

**SAN FRANCISCO, March 13.**—The American ship *Manga Reva*, formerly the British bark *Pyrene*, once given up as a wreck in *Manga Reva Lagoon* in the South Seas, arrived yesterday from Baltimore with a cargo of coal. Captain Townsend reports that on December 23, John Couriana, a seaman, fell from the mizen topmast yard to the deck and was instantly killed. J. Hunter, second mate of the *Manga Reva*, is one of the five survivors of the American bark *Pyrene*, who was wrecked in the Straits of Le Maire some months ago. The survivors, including the captain, who subsequently went insane as a result of his privations, existed for 40 days on shell fish on an island in the Straits before being rescued and taken to Montevideo. The men went thence to New York.

### WATER SUPPLY FOR OAKLAND

**SAN FRANCISCO, March 13.**—The problem of a greater water supply for Greater Oakland is being worked out on a mammoth scale. The system, which will require four years to build and the estimated cost of which will be \$10,000,000 has been necessary it is said by the doubling of the population of Oakland and environs. The enterprise involves the building of a network of tunnels and pipe lines covering a new drainage area of 108 square miles and requiring the acquisition of 22,000 acres of real estate holdings.

## THE FILIPINO MUSIC

Has Been Slowly Developed By the Church.

### ARE BARBOD INSTRUMENTS

The Phonograph Has Brought Its Way Into the Philippine Islands and Every "Illustrated" Down There, With a Fair Collection of Records.

All oriental music is primitive music. From the wild war chant of the Borneo Dyak through the whole range of Hindoo, Filipino, Chinese and Japanese musical expression, there is a little that is not crude and cumbersome. The Japanese have little that is musical. The Chinese have the feathered scale with its minor cadence and absence of half-tones, and there is in all "East of Suez" little that corresponds to modern music.

The one apparent exception to this rule is in the Philippine Islands, and the higher expression there of musical feeling is a development of later growth. Through 300 years the church has been slowly developing the musical sense of the people. In comparison with what might have been done in the last eight years, the progress made was exceedingly small, but it was something.

The average Filipino voice is not highly musical. The people sing, but they sing as they speak, in a nasal, forced tone that has little beauty of timbre. That this timbre quality is mainly due to imitation and lack of general culture is proven by the fact that the voices of the children are smooth and musical, and when properly taught they sing with accurate intonation and in excellent tone. The occasional soprano who has been trained under the old Filipino-Spanish school sings with a cloud of flourishes, trills and strained effects that is disagreeable to a cultured ear, but it is regarded as the summit of perfection by the gazing people who are unable to imitate or follow the dizzy flight.

The boys' choirs of the churches are effective much as the reed pipes of their old organs. High, strident tones come down from the galleries, and any sort of true falsetto tone from these boys is never heard. As they are taught and accompanied entirely by men, the cause is not far to seek. The training of these boys is an interesting performance. I saw 300 of them one day in the cathedral learning a chant. They were arranged in squads and platoons with a sub-leader in charge of every ten boys. These leaders were directed by the maestro himself, who stood by near the big organ. Every sub-leader held in his left hand a book, and in his right hand a stick, and in his left hand a book, and in his right hand a stick, and in his left hand a book, and in his right hand a stick.

The almost utter absence of congregational singing may account for some of the details of better vocal work on the part of the common people. On the occasion of choral outbreaks, the professional to San Roque was accompanied by a hymn so dismal and terror-inspiring that it would seem that the children would have left their seats in self-defense. Through an endless series of stanzas recounting the exploits of the original saint when upon earth was the recurring refrain: "From the contagion, O San Roque, Protect thy children, we invoke thee." The wailing minor was fit expression for the emotions of a time when on every hand people were falling from the fearful scourge.

That the people enter heartily into choral singing and enjoy it greatly is well established. The director of music of the public schools of Manila has developed some very effective choral work among the pupils of the high school grade, and the Protestant services throughout the island are characterized by vigorous rendering of the hymns.

There is a general absence of any sort of bass quality of voice. In the service of the Catholic church this quality is supplied by the priests, some of the old friars possessing
