AVERBUCH FINALLY BURIED.

CHICAGO, Mar. 13.—The Tribune to-day says:

Carefully laid plans for the defense of the name of Lazarus Averbuch, who attempted to assassinate chief of Police Shippy, were revealed yesterday when the body of the youth was exhumed from the Potter's Field and re-buried after an autopsy.

It developed that John Maynard Harlan's law firm has been retained to represent the friends of the young man at the inquest which will be held next week. Attorney Harold Le Clair Ickles, Mr. Harlan's associate, attended the autopsy, which was performed by Dr. Ludwig Hektoen of the Rush Medical College. The famous pathologist has been retained by the same influential interests that secured Mr. Harlan as legal representative. The secret of the employment of these eminent advisers came out in spite of extraordinary efforts made to preserve it until the inquest. All indications point to a sensational attempt to prove Averbuch was a martyr.

One of the most interesting facts that developed was that Mr. Harlan and Dr. Hektoen were retained by persons not known to have been affiliated with the anarchist leaders who had taken the initiative in defending the act of Averbuch.

The autopsy on the body of Averbuch was performed in the clinical laboratory at the Dunning insane hospital near the Potter's Field. The examination took place in the presence of city and county officials and representatives of the police and the family and friends of the dead boy. The gunshot wounds were examined with great minuteness and probed for the bullets, several of which were extracted from the body, to be used as exhibits at the inquest.

The body was then taken to Ridgeway, a Jewish cemetery, and re-buried.

NEW YORK, March 13.—Arrange-

ments have been completed for a brief spring concert tour for Enrico Caruso, the famous tenor of the Metropolitan Opera House. The tour will begin May 1 at Columbus, Ohio, and will continue for two and a half weeks, the other cities to be visited being Detroit, Cleveland, Buffalo, Toronto, Montreal and two others to be selected.
