PORTLAND, March 26.—Following the jump of 30 cents the first week, sugar made another sensational advance today, when the jobbing trade announced a second 30-cent lift in the prices of all grades of the refined article.

An advance of 60 cents a hundred within a week is something out of the ordinary in the local sugar market, but the higher prices were made necessary by the advances that have taken place recently in the Eastern markets. Not in years have the sugar markets of the world been in so excited a condition as now.

There was a firmer feeling in the egg market today, due largely to a better shipping inquiry, and though receipts continue large there was a disposition to hold for half a cent more than the prices that have prevailed thus far this week. Today's quotations were 15 to 15-2 cents for uncandled stocks and 16 for carefully candled goods.
