Telegraph Goes Over Bar Bound for the Sound.

ARMERIA TO BE OVERHAULED

Fleet Due In From San Francisco—Mosquito Squadron Sails for Coast Ports—Colonna and Jules Gomme Go Over Bar Rose City Out.

Captain McFarland went over the Columbia bar last evening at 5:15 o'clock, with the Telegraph, bound for Seattle. It is hoped her hog-chains and weather bulkheads will hold and that she will get in without trouble. She will make time, all right.

The steamer Alliance arrived from Coos yesterday morning and docked at the Callender pier; going on to Portland within the hour.

The steamship Rose City came down from the Rose City early yesterday morning with plenty of San Francisco bound business, and went over the bar on the morning ebb.

The French bark Jules Gomme was one of the get-aways from this port yesterday, leaving out for Europe with her cargo of wheat during the forenoon.

The schooner Albert Myer arrived down early yesterday morning on the hawser of the steamer Melville and will go to sea and San Francisco today.

The big oil tanker Asuncion came down from Portland and put to sea yesterday morning.

Captain Birkland took the Coloano over the bar yesterday morning, bound for Europe, with the tug Walula in the lead over the bar.

The Norwegian steamship Elsa went up the river yesterday morning and will load wheat at Portland for the Orient.

The German bark Nareus, Captain Moller, is the next ship to come down from Portland, and may be down today on the Harvest Queen.

The steamship Breakwater is due in port this morning from Coos Bay.

The little two-master schooner Letitia came in from the Bay City yesterday and went up the river on the lines of the Oklahoma yesterday afternoon.

The "pups" all got away yesterday. The Evie for the Sulaw, the Della for Nestucca, and the Gerald C for Alesa.

Three steamers are due in here from San Francisco tomorrow, to-wit: The Daisy Freeman, Cascades and John Poulsen, and they will be followed quickly by others now that the tie-up is broken.

The tender of the De Forest Oil Company, the Minnette, went out on her maiden trip yesterday afternoon with a party of interested observers on board, and the little launch behaved finely. She is one of the neatest things on the bay of her class.

The lighthouse tender Armeria, Captain Gregory, is billed for a complete line of repairs and improvements, machinery and housing, and bids were opened yesterday at Portland in this behalf. The lowest bid received was in the sum of \$9,121, which indicates that the scope of work is large.

The French bark Andre Theodore, Captain Robert, arrived down yesterday afternoon on the tow lines of the Oklahoma. She went to an anchorage in the lower harbor.
