

APPROPRIATION FOR FORTS

WASHINGTON, April 2 .- An ap propriation to carry into effect contemplated fortifications for Puget Sound as planned by the Endicott and Taft boards, has been agreed upon tentatively yesterday by the subcommittee of the senate committee on appropriations which is considering the general fortification bill. When completed this work will represent an outlay of between nine and ten million dollars, of which more than four million dollars already has been appropriated.

NEVADA BANKING SCORED.

Officials and State Examiners Condemned by Grand Jury

GOLDFIELD, Nev., April 2 .- The Esmeralda County grand jury, having investigated the affairs of the State Bank & Trust Co., yesterday found two indictments against the president, T. B. Rickey, charging embezzlement. The report scores the State bank examiners and implies that their failure to act was owing to Rickey having made the State a preferred creditor and having made the State's account secure with marketable bonds and stock which were converted into cash.
