PORTLAND MARKETS

Quotations in the Portland Market.

Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce, and Vegetables.

PORTLAND, April 8.—Receipts of eggs from the country continue on a liberal scale and the market as viewed by front street jobbers is steady, with the tendency toward weakness. Occasional shipments north are made, but they are for the Sound and not for the Alaskan trade.

For the rest of this week there will be practically no fresh salmon in the local market. Advices from the South today say that fishing on the Sacramento River, the source of supply at this time, has been interrupted by unfavorable weather, and no further shipments north will be made for several days. Other fish are in fair supply today, with no changes from the quotations of several days back.

Two cars of Southern cabbage came in today, and in addition the steamer last night brought a considerable quantity of mixed truck. Vegetables of all sorts are fairly plentiful and the market steady, with prices for the most part unchanged.
