PORTLAND MARKETS

Quotations in the Portland Market.

Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce, and Vegetables.

PORTLAND, May 13.—Creamery men say butter is moving in a satisfactory manner at the new price and it is understood that the quotation is uniform in the city creamery trade. There is a fair outside demand and this makes it possible to maintain the present price. In the country creamery market conditions have changed but little. The price range is 20c to 24c, but the bulk of the business is done around 22c.

The egg market today was fairly firm, quotations running from 18c to 19c, with some sales of single case lots at 19 1/2 cents reported.

At the meeting of the Portland Produce Merchants' Association last night it was decided that beginning this week all the front street commission houses will close their doors at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. In the past the bulk of the business done in the market district on Saturday has been done before 3 o'clock, only scattering, belated buyers appearing after that time. By a recent decision of the association the stores are no longer opened on Sundays.

The bulk of the berries that came in from the South today showed better quality than those of some days past, and this was also true of Oregon offerings. But there were some inferior berries and it was hard to move these at any price. The best Californias were held at \$1.50 to \$1.75 a crate, while Oregon sold at 10c to 12 1/2c a pound. Receipts of Californians totalled a little more than a carload.

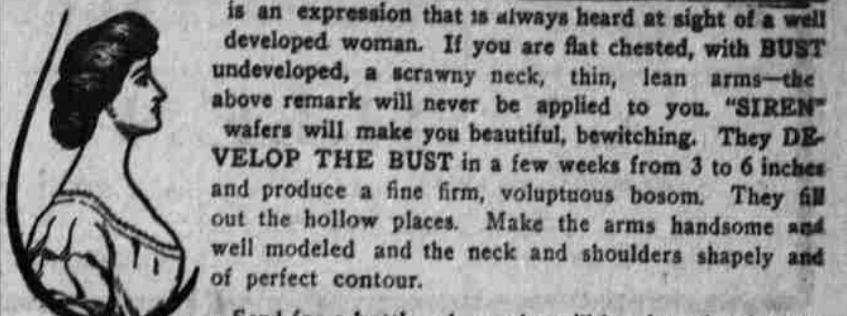
