**SELECTING A TEAM VREELAND BILL**

Olympic Committee Jubilant Over Team for London

Put Through the House Under a Special Rule

REPRESENT UNITED STATES

WILLIAMS REFUSED HIS BILL

Within the Past Year This Country Has Developed Long Distance Runners That Are by no Means Below the Average.

When it Goes to the Senate Aldrich Will Call a Meeting of the Finance Committee and All House Amendments Will be Eliminated.

NEW YORK, May 14.—Following the Pacific Coast tryouts which were held at Stanford University in California, members of the Olympic committee are jubilant over the fact that everything now points to a winning team to represent the United States in London in July.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—The Vreeland currency bill was today put through the house under a special rule by a vote of 184 to 145. Fifteen of the so-called insurgents of the majority party voted with the Democrats who went on record solidly against the measure. The closing moments of the debate were replete with excitement and republican enthusiasm caused by the refusal of a great majority of the democrats to go on record for the Williams bill, which had been offered by Kahn, of California, as a substitute for Vreeland bill, in accordance with the well laid plan of the majority leaders to ascertain where the democrats stood on the proposition, which it was claimed by several was supported by Bryan. Ninety-three democrats voted "Present" which aroused the republicans to a high state of hilarity at the expense of the minority. Only a handful of democrats had the temerity to vote "Aye" or "No." The action of Kahn was due to refusal of Williams to present his bill as a substitute which under the rule he was specially authorized to do.

The only thing that is worrying us now," said James E. Sullivan, secretary of the committee, "is the picking of the team. That is a hard problem. Within the past month reports have been received from all over the country stating that some athlete has been breaking world's records in practice. If these reports are true there will be many upsets when all the tryouts are held, and perhaps some of those who were looked on as sure winners will of necessity be left at home. "Of course this will not happen if we receive enough money. At present we have sufficient to send a winning team but I am in hopes that before the boys sail on June 21 there will be enough to send every athlete who has a chance of gaining a point."

While reports of wonderful feats have been received here, experts who have heard thousands of these reports before claims it was seasoned champion who will perform best and win out when the proper time comes.

As soon as bill reaches the senate, Aldrich will call a meeting of the finance committee to consider it. It is expected that the committee will vote unanimously to amend the house measure by striking out all amendments after enacting a clause and inserting the provisions of the bill which was passed by the senate. It is not doubted the senate will approve of the action of committee. The effect of this could be to send both the Vreeland and the Aldrich bills to a conference.

**SEARCHING FOR INCENDIARY**

CHICAGO, May 14.—Detectives in the employ of Chicago Board of Education are searching for an incendiary who attempted to burn the Clarke public school, containing 1600 children at Ashland avenue and West Thirteenth street.

All of these have consistently and persistently shown form that stands out by itself and trainers claim nothing less than serious accidents can prevent them from making the team. With this number every member of the committee is sanguine of success. The committee has decided to hold the wrestling tryouts on May 26 and 27, instead of May 25 and 26. In all probability these tryouts will only take one night as the fact that only native born or fully naturalized citizens of America are eligible will keep a number of entries away.

The fire which started at the foot of one of the stairways, on Monday, was discovered in time to prevent the spread of the flames. No fire alarm was sounded and but few of the children in the school knew anything about the tragedy that threatened them. That the attempt to murder of innocents was perpetrated wilfully, principal and teachers and members of the school board do not doubt.

Use a galvanized tub 17 inches deep and 17 inches wide, with straight sides—not flaring, with drop handles one-third from top of tub is best, although the washer can be used in any tub or boiler. Cover clothes with water deep enough to cover caps of washer when held down. Press down a number of times opposite you at the outer edge of the tub with a quick, firm pressure, before moving the washer. Then move over the width of the machine. The washer can be used, also, to rinse with. Do not overload it and the machine will wash as much as any \$10 washer, and do it easier and in less time. It will wash whole carpets, Oriental rugs, lace curtains, loose wool or wooden comforts. Follow directions and it will please you.
