

MISS ELLA POWELL RANKS FIRST

The Automobile and Piano Arrived Last Night and Are Now on Display

The Automobile and Piano the two grand prizes, which will be given away in the Astorian's popular voting contest has arrived and will be on display on the main street. The Piano is on exhibition in P. A. Stokes's Dry-goods store on Commercial street and can be seen any time in the window. We haven't decided as yet what window we will put the Automobile in, but it can be seen on the main street, or at the Astorian office. A word in regard to the Reo Automobile, a wonderfully speedy, natty, spunky little car, it's hard to believe the truth of what it will do and en, dare, and still "comes up smiling."

This is the runabout that carried four people 682 miles for \$3.38 per passenger, in the New York Motor Club's six day economy test, strong, steady, reliable and stylish. There are those who declare it is "too much for the money."

The standing of the candidates from yesterday's count, is as follows. Miss Ella Powell leads the contest with a large vote of 53,681 to her credit, with Miss Frances Norberg second with 42,972 votes to her credit, and Miss Edith Smith in that district third with 35,976 votes. Second district Miss Mary Fossett leads with 34,914 votes to her credit, with Miss Martha Foard a close second with 28,910 votes to her credit and Miss Birdie Wise third with 27,454 votes to her credit.

First district Miss Mamie Wilson leads with 29,974 votes to her credit with Miss Anna Bue a close second with 29,694 votes to her credit, and Miss Enberg third with 28,960 votes to her credit.

There is a ballot box in the Astorian office where the votes may be deposited for any young ladies whom you may see fit to vote for. If you cannot bring the ballots to the office, send them in by mail to the Contest Manager and the votes will be accorded to the young lady for whom they are intended. The votes are counted twice, so there can be no mistake as to the proper number of ballots accorded to each candidate. The votes are always open for inspection to insure a fair deal.

HOW TO WIN.

The easiest and quickest way to win is for candidates to ask their friends to prepay their subscription for 6 to 12 months. It costs the subscriber nothing extra to do this and they are saved the annoyance of weekly and monthly collections. By so doing you receive a special vote ballot which is good any time during the contest.

Orders for the prizes will be given the successful contestants at the close of the contest; same may be used by the contestant herself or disposed of in any manner she may see fit.

Any young lady residing in the above mentioned territory is eligible

to compete in this contest.

Anyone who desires to vote in this contest may do so by ballots cut from the Daily and Weekly Astorian, or by special vote coupons obtained by subscribing to the Astorian. The coupons secured by subscribing to the Astorian may be held as long as desired and voted at any time up to the desired close of the contest, but ballots cut from the Astorian are only good for one week from publication and will not be counted if voted after the date printed on the ballot.
