ASTORIA TO CELEBRATE THE 4TH

ALL PREPARATIONS AND ARRANGEMENTS TO BE UNDERTAKEN BY THE CLERKS' UNION.

That Astoria is to have a Fourth of July celebration this year was determined last night at a meeting in the Chamber of Commerce rooms. A number of Astoria's prominent merchants were present as well as several members of the Clerks' Union, Mayor Herman Wise, presided as chairman of the meeting, and Mr. Clark, secretary. After considerable discussion as to who would undertake the management of the celebration this year, a motion was made and carried to give it into the hands of the Clerks' Union, as they made such an excellent showing a few years ago when they directed it. The Clerks' Union will now go to work in earnest to make this year's Fourth the greatest in the history of the city. A committee will be appointed by them to raise funds, and they were assured the moral support, and as much financially as possible by every merchant present. After the committee have reported their work, and the boys find that they are still a little short of cash to make the event the success they contemplate, they will appoint another committee to call on the Regatta treasurer to appropriate the reserve fund of \$415 or as much of it as they need to the Fourth of July committee. The appropriation will be made without any difficulty, as the Fourth of July committee several years ago made the same appropriation to the Regatta committee for the Regatta. The Clerks' Union will also make an effort to have free boats run across the river during the celebration and Mr. Johnson expressed his opinion that the A. & C. R. R. Co. would make the one and one-third rate for the round trip from all points on their line to Astoria. The boys of the Clerks' Union will go to work at once as the time is growing short and everybody is requested to help them as much as possible to make this year's celebration the grandest and most successful one ever held in the city.

Rumored Purchase.—The Morning Astorian was placed in possession of the important and mooted fact that the entire interest of the Old Oregon Mills, at Warrenton, in this county, has been purchased outright by the A. B. Hammond interest. It could not be confirmed last night from any source of authority; but it hails from sources not likely to be mistaken in the premises; and if true, is significant of large development of the Hammond properties in that neighborhood.

Nabbed Yesterday.—Robert Casey, the man who was indicted by the grand jury last September for an attempted rape upon the person of Miss Hakala near Olney, but who fled the country, and for whom Judge McBride issued a bench warrant, with bond fixed at \$1000, had the temerity to return to this city a day or two ago and engage at work, thinking perhaps he had been forgotten, was nabbed by Deputy Sheriff Archie McLean yesterday afternoon and clobbered in the county jail, in default of the bond required, and he will answer in full before the Circuit Court at the ensuing term.

Grist to the Mill.—Word was received in this city last night from private sources that Columbia county gave the "Fish-wheel" bill 679 affirmative votes and 959 negatives, and gave the "Gill-Netters" bill 1187 yeases and 404 nays. That Yamhill county gave the former 1454 affirmatives and 1117 nays; while voting "yes" 1536 times for the lower river bill and 908 nays. This gives the honest bill devised to save the salmon industry, additional leeway of 2021 votes by direct majority and by the negative ballots cast against the make-shift from the predatory fishermen.
