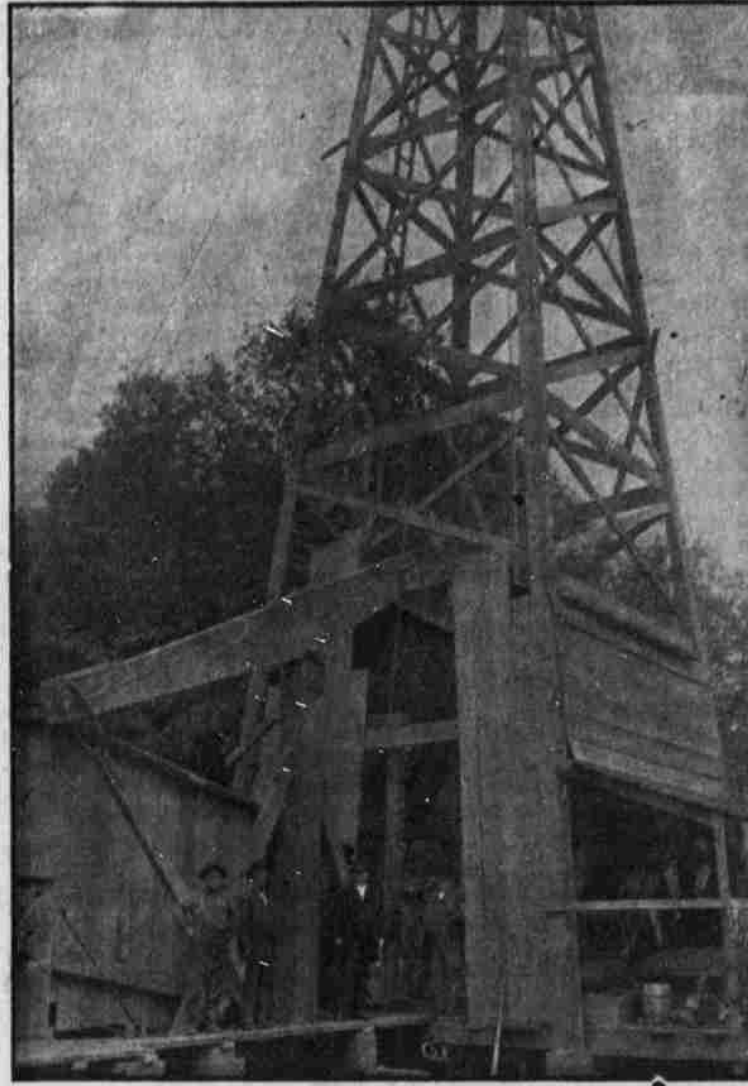

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, June 23.—"There will in all probability be a better market for Oregon potatoes this Fall and Winter than a year ago," said a local jobber today. "The prospect in this state, so far as can be learned at this time, is for a crop about the size of last year. In some of the other states the situation is quite different. Colorado has for three months been suffering from extremely dry weather, and recent reports from some of the principal potato-producing districts of that state say that the yield this year will be but a fraction of that of other years. In the Greeley district, where immense quantities of spuds are usually grown, the water supply this year has been so limited that the crop generally will be a failure."
