

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, July 29.—More Oregon apples than ever before will go to the Orient this year, and as yet there is nothing in sight that can be figured on as adversely affecting the prices at which the fruit will move in that part of the world. Local fruit men have no fear that the financial depression that prevails more or less generally in the Far East will have any serious effect on the apple trade. Oregon apples are something of a luxury in China, Manchuria and Siberia, and the consumers there are those who can afford to pay for them. They are not yet an article.

There was a weaker feeling in the poultry market today, and the disposition to cut prices in order to move stocks was more or less general. Price shading amounted to about a cent all around, and unless buyers show more interest in the market the next few days the chances are that quotations will go still lower before the end of the week. Hens were especially hard to move today, but fryers and broilers were also sluggish.
