

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, Aug. 10—The potato crop of Multnomah and adjacent counties, which are the leading spud producers of the state, has been hard hit by the dry, hot weather of the past 40 days. There is no crop in the state more in need of moisture now, and if rain does not come with in the next two weeks the chances are that the crop to be harvested in the Fall will be a very light one.

The early crop, which is now being dug to some extent, shows the effect of the long dry spell, particularly in districts where the soil is not of a character to retain moisture well. There tubers not more than half grown have ripened prematurely along with others that are about normal size, and the result is a lighter yield than usual, with a considerable proportion of undersized and inferior potatoes, which will have to be thrown out in assorting if the growers expect to get top prices for the product.
