

MOBS STILL RULE

Evidences Plentiful, in Small Way, of Vicious Spirit

ARRESTS AND PROSECUTIONS

Rewards Are Having Good Effect—Militia Present in Indiana Capitol by Thousands—Victims Are Dying Daily—Going For the Leaders.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 18.—That the mob spirit has not been entirely subdued in Springfield was evidenced last night and early today when despite the presence of thousands of militiamen there were sporadic outbreaks of lawlessness in many sections of the city.

None of them was serious, however, being confined to disturbances caused by groups of two or three men.

The center of the trouble was Harvard Park, a suburb where twice during the night patrols were fired upon from ambush. Troops were rushed to the scene both times and during the second a shot fired from an alley struck the sword scabbard of Lieutenant Ridgeway. The shooter escaped.

The first disturbance followed an attack upon Tom Richardson, a brother of George Richardson, the negro accused of having assaulted Mrs. Mable Hallam. Richardson who was a driver for a packing firm, left his wagon standing in the street and escaped to the Illinois Central station where he took a train for Mississippi.

Later guards picked up James and William Richardson, also brothers of George Richardson, and locked them in the jail. It is stated that they had been inmates of the Jacksonville asylum, and that their arrest was a measure taken for public safety.

Five men were arrested at 8th and Ash streets. Two hundred dollars reward for evidence leading to conviction in each of the cases of violent death during the rioting in this city is offered by Governor Deneen. The Governor, who is determined to punish all proven to have participated in the deeds of violence, last night issued six proclamations, one covering each of the cases of death resulting from the race outbreak. The same reward is offered in each instance and it is hoped to secure the evidence necessary to convict the leaders responsible for the cries.

Plans for the prosecution of all who had anything to do with the riots have been completed by the city and state officials. There will be no half way measures taken and the laws action will be swift, certain and impartial.

The task which the authorities face was increased yesterday by two more deaths and news that a third victim of the riot of last Friday night is dying. Martin Scott a white man who was shot through the lungs, during the riot Friday night, died last night. The other death is that of the three week-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Paine, negro reingees at Pittsfield. The child died from exposure, as the result of a night flight from Springfield.

W. H. Bowe, chief clerk of the county treasurer's office, who was attacked and shot by negroes Saturday while walking through the burned district, is reported dying at St. John's hospital. The state's attorney has secured from him an ante mortem statement.

To Honor Cy Young Aug. 13. Notwithstanding President Johnson's dispensation to permit Detroit to meet Boston in the game on "Young day," Detroit will be unable to, Boston having a postponed game to play at home on Cy Young day, Aug. 13. Secretary Hugh McBreen suggested to President Navin that in the event of Detroit being unable to play the loan of a couple of players would be appreciated. Other clubs in the league will be appealed to in a like manner. This latter request, President Navin writes, he will gladly honor. The plan is now to make up a strong American league team with picked players from all teams to play against Boston. A picked team would bring out some fine ball and give the fans a good day's sport for a good cause.

Cincinnati's New Infielder. Manager Gannel of the Cincinnati Nationals has signed First Baseman Arnold of the Shreveport (La.) club, who has been highly recommended to him as a fine batsman and a complete all around man, capable of playing either first base or the outfield.

Gannel's ankle is troubling him a good deal, and he realizes that the club will need an active man to take his place on the bag in case he is compelled to retire.

HARDNESS OF DIAMONDS.

The Stones Can Be Forced by Pressure Into Steel Blocks.

A word as to the hardness of diamonds. They vary much in this respect. Even different parts of the same crystal differ in their resistance to cutting and grinding. So hard is diamond in comparison to glass that a suitable splinter of diamond will plane curls off a glass plate as a carpenter's tool will plane shavings off a deal board. Another experiment that will illustrate its hardness is to place a diamond on the flattened end of a conical block of steel and upon it bring another similar cone of steel. If I force them together with hydraulic power, I can force the stone into the steel blocks without injuring the diamond in the least. The pressure which I have brought to bear in this experiment has been equal to 170 tons a square inch of diamond.

The only serious rival of the diamond in hardness is the metal tantalum. In an attempt to bore a hole through a plate of this metal a diamond drill was used, revolving at the rate of 5,000 revolutions a minute. This whirling force was continued ceaselessly for three days and nights, when it was found that only a small point one-fourth of a millimeter deep had been drilled, and it was a moot point which had suffered most damage, the diamond or the tantalum.

After exposure for some time to the sun many diamonds glow in a dark room. One beautiful green diamond in my collection when phosphorescing in a vacuum gives almost as much light as a candle, and you can easily read by its rays. But the time has hardly come when we can use diamonds as domestic illuminants.—Sir William Crookes in North American Review.

Strapping a Razor. In strapping a razor the blade should be drawn across the strap from the heel to the point, at the same time going the full length of the strap. In shaving this motion should be reversed, the blade traveling from point to heel. The reason of this is that the edge of the blade has tiny, sawlike teeth, and the opposite movements use these to the best advantage.
