READY-TO-SERVE-SPEECHES.

Bryan to Use Moving Pictures and Phonographs in Campaign.

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—Another feature which will be used in conjunction with the talking machine has been added to the novelty of the presidential campaign by the national committee of the democratic party which announced today that moving pictures of Colonel Bryan in Chicago on labor day could be thrown on canvas at political meetings all over the country. While the pictures are being thrown, the candidate's voice will be heard from phonographic records of his labor day address.

NOMINATE FULL TICKET.

State Convention Endorses Republican Platform and Taft.

DENVER, Sept. 12.—In less than six hours of deliberation, the republican state convention today nominated the full state ticket and presidential electors and adopted the platform endorsing Judge Taft and renewing allegiance to the national organization. The platform comments Senator Guggenheim, "For his efficient and faithful services." The ticket is headed by Jesse F. McDonald, of Lake, for governor.

MACK MAKES APPOINTMENTS

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—Chairman Mack today announced the appointment of former Chairman Taggart as head of the Commercial Travelers' Association of the democratic national committee and William Hogg of New York as vice-chairman. The national committee has arranged to have Colonel Bryan make several train speeches on the run from Rochester to Buffalo where the candidate will speak September 21st.

TOLD BY THE THUMB.

REILLY AFTER MORE HONORS.

Swimmer Who Recently Defeated Bud Goodwin Aims For National Title.

Not content with having annexed a championship to his credit, James H. Reilly, the seventeen-year-old swimmer of Townsend Harris Hall, New York, has already begun to prepare himself for the national championships.

Nearly every day since he defeated Bud Goodwin of the New York Athletic club for the quarter mile title at Travers Island, New York, Reilly has practiced hard. His mind is set upon winning a national title, and to do this he realizes that he must attain more speed.

"That boy is one of the fastest youngsters I ever saw," said a former champion after the youngster had won his championship. "If he improves as steadily during the next few months as he has during the past he will compel Charlie Daniels, the 'human fish,' to improve in order to maintain his records."

While Reilly is only a youngster in years, he has acquired the muscles of a man. He is nearly six feet tall and

weighs 170 pounds. His muscles are well developed, and he has mastered the various strokes of the expert swimmer.

Reilly has been swimming only three years. He began his aquatic career in the tanks of the public baths in New York city. With each trial he has improved steadily. Three times he has competed in championship events, but he was never able to finish better than third until his recent effort.

At school he is a model student and because of his popularity among the students was recently elected captain of the track team. Besides being a swimmer of championship caliber, Reilly is proficient at other branches of sport. He is a fair runner and jumper and plays baseball and football creditably. He is also captain of the Townsend Harris Hall track team.
