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#### PRESIDENT MAKES URGENT APPEAL FOR TAFTS SUPPORT

Answers to Hearst-Foraker Controversy

TAFT AGAINST TRUSTS

Roosevelt Points Out Candidates Attitude Against Moneyed Interests

SILENT REMAINS

President in His Statement, Says Taft's Defeat Would Bring Everlasting Satisfaction to That Set of Men Behind Foraker.

OYSTER BAY, Sept. 21 .- Late today Secretary Loeb gave to representatives of the press a formal statement by the president which was called forth by the recent statement of exchanges between W. R. Hearst and Senator Foraker. Hearst in public utterances had accused the Senator of relations with the Standard Oil Company, as inconsistent with his duties as Senator, and his attitude as representative of Republican policies and professions. In today's statement Roosevelt makes another appeal for the support of Taft and declares that his defeat would bring "Lasting satisfaction to but one set of men, namely, to those men who, as shown in the correspondence published by Hearst were behind Foraker, the opponent of Taft within his own party and who is now behind Governor Haskell and his associates, the opponents of Taft in the opposite party."
