

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND Sept. 28.—War is on among factors in the local hay trade, and what will be the outcome of the trouble that has been brewing for a long time between wholesalers and retailers is the subject of a good deal of lively speculation. In any event the market is unsettled, and some of the reports that are in circulation would seem to indicate that it is verging toward demoralization.

The trouble started about two years ago, when some of the younger firms in the retail trade began hay supplies in a small way in the country and taking proportionately less from the regular wholesalers who hitherto had practically controlled the business of buying and bringing to the city the hay needed for the local trade. In the course of a year a number of the older wholesalers who had been in the business for years began to feel the effect of the free lance operations of the newcomers, for their trade fell away materially, and in the past 12 months the situation from their point of view has grown steadily worse.
