VOLCANO IN ACTION.

HONOLULU, Hawaii, Oct. 1--I have just returned from my first visit to the Volcano of Kilauea, but like everyone who has been there, I hesitate to attempt a description of what seems totally to defy all powers of written or verbal expression. The immensity and unapproached grandeur of the spectacle is almost stupefying, and written words seem flat and colorless when applied to it, in the same way that no photographs of it has ever been taken, or picture painted which is not a disappointment after one has stood on the brink of that awful abyss, and all of ones senses have struggled to comprehend the titanic forces and their results spread on below.

Kilauea is little like the conventional volcano of our geography. There is no towering mountain, such as of Vesuvius of Popocatepetl. Instead one makes a gradual ascent from the seaport of Hilo, in a parlor car of a well equipped railway train for 22 miles, and then continues the same gentle rise for nine miles further by carriage through a dense forest of giant ferns, to come suddenly out at the end upon the edge of a great precipice some one thousand feet in height, which is the edge of the crater. This is at an elevation of about 4,000 feet above the sea level, and a very matter of fact sort of hotel stands almost on the edge of the cliff.

The main crater of the volcano is simply a tremendous pit almost circular in shape and from four to seven miles in diameter, with almost vertical lava sides. Not far from the center of this great hole is a much smaller pit in the floor of the main crater, and it is in this pit that all of the modern volcanic activity takes place. This crater within a crater, is from 1,000 to 2,000 feet in diameter, and its depth varies from a few feet to a thousand or more, according to the rise and fall of the modern lava lake which forms its floor.

To reach Halemaumau, as the active crater is known in Hawaiian, one must go down into the main crater by a narrow horse trail cut in the cliff near where the hotel stands, and after reaching the lava floor travel for three miles or more across a great black lava field, which forms a most fantastic piece of scenery, and reminds one of pictures he has seen of the surface of the moon. To all appearances the hardened lava over which one walks or rides might have been poured out yesterday, but this part of the pit has not been in activity within historic times. Every curve and wave of the lava which it had when in a modern state, is preserved, and one passes cascades, and pyramids, and streams of lava on which he is almost afraid to trust himself, so strongly do they resemble a plastic flowing mass. But they are all frozen into a glass like hardness,

WILL INVESTIGATE.

CHICAGO, Oct. 6--An investigation of the reports that thousands of school children in Chicago are underfed was ordered last night by the city council which resumed its work after the summer vacation. The committee on schools was instructed to inquire into the situation and recommend a measure of relief.

The heads of the city government and of the school board made arrangements yesterday for gathering of municipal officers and officers of charitable organizations to fix up a definite, immediate plan of relief. The executive committee of the Civic Federation also took action looking toward an elaborate investigation of conditions in poorer homes of the city.

and the brittle broken pieces crunch under foot like dry snow or ice crystals. The contraction of the lava in cooling has produced great cracks running in every direction, like those seen in dried mud deposits on a river bank, only on a gigantic scale. Some of these cracks still give off much heat and over these tourists are wont to scorch cards as souvenirs, or cook meals of ham and eggs and coffee.

But Halemaumau is the great attraction, and everything else pales into insignificance beside it when it is active. During the past six months the fires are said to have been unusually active and the lava rose to within fifty feet of the top, forming a lake estimated at seventeen acres in extent. When I saw it the lake had dropped back probably three hundred feet, but I cannot imagine any more wonderful display under any other condition. The pit had begun to fill again when I first viewed it; and sometimes as many as a dozen fire fountains would be playing at one time from various parts of the surface of the lake. Then an accumulation of gases would suddenly explode beneath the surface, and the whole lake would be thrown into violent commotion, like some huge cauldron boiling furiously.

The appearance is constantly changing. The surface cools within a few minutes after it comes in contact with the air, and forms a dark brown crust over the molten surface. This is constantly breaking and being traversed by brilliant white cracks, forming patterns of fascinating and infinite variety. At night the display baffles all attempts to describe, and visitors simply stand in awe-struck fascination, while tremendous forces, beyond the power of human mind to comprehend, work unceasingly.

Kilauea is the only volcano in the world which may be watched in safety at close range, and the wonderful chemistry of nature studied. During the past few months it has been visited by many hundreds of persons, alike. It has a fascination which one has a fascination which one finds difficult to describe, and visitors simply stand in awe-struck fascination, while tremendous forces, beyond the power of human mind to comprehend, work unceasingly.
