

CHINESE RIOTERS GO FOR HOME MERCHANTS

FOR DARING TO HANDLE JAPANESE PRODUCTS—CAST GOODS IN STREETS.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 24.—With 3,500 tons of hemp and general merchandise and forty seven Chinese, the steamer Teucer arrived tonight from Liverpool and the Orient. A strong southeast gale was encountered with high confused head seas and the steamer was put about with the wind. On November 16, head winds and a strong head swell were afterwards encountered and the gale did not abate for five days. When the Teucer was at Hong Kong there were serious anti-Japanese riots going on and many shops and Go Downs were looted by an organized mob of rioters as a result of the displeasure of the Chinese because of the efforts of the government to put down the boycott against Japanese on the part of the Chinese of the colony. Armed police were called out to disperse the mobs and 12 Chinese were arrested. The opening of the rioting was at the two Go Downs of the Chinese firms on Kao Shing street. The firms dealt extensively in Japanese goods, particularly dried fish. Two hundred rioters broke open the doors and threw goods to the value of \$6000 into the street, where it was destroyed or carried away. At 7 p. m. on Nov. 1 the rioting grew in violence and seemed well organized. The Chinese Go Downs and shops containing Japanese goods had been marked out, and a plan of campaign seemed to be followed. The police dispersed the mobs but they regathered smashing doors open, leaving the premises a wreck. The European and Sikh police were armed with rifles, revolvers and ball cartridges. All night the streets were crowded with rioters, who broke, slashed and looted, paying special attention to the fish shops which had Japanese wares in stock.

In many places the rioters showed fight when the police came, and the police, assisted by some sailors armed with batons, replied to showers of stones from the mob, with charges, in which there was some vigorous hitting and a good many sore heads. At one stage the police fired bayonets to prevent attempts at the rescue of prisoners. The cause of the riots was an effort made by the Chinese merchants interested in importing Japanese goods to end the boycott, and one of the promoters of this movement was waylaid and one of his ears cut off.

Captain Parkinson of the Teucer, was one of the fifteen survivors of the wreck of the Great Eastern Railway's steamer Berlin in February last off the Hook of Holland, when 127 lives were lost. He was washed overboard after the steamer broke in two and was in the icy water twenty minutes before being rescued by a lifeboat. He acted splendidly throughout the disaster and was the recipient of warm praise from Wilhelm and Crown Prince Henry who took an active part in the rescue.

News was brought by the Teucer that arrangements are being perfected for a steamship service by the Toyokisen Taiisha between Japan and Salina Cruz.

Mr. Shirashi is supposed to have concluded satisfactory arrangements with the government of Mexico and the Japanese authorities are willing to grant a subsidy to the line which will give the Japanese shippers a direct connection with the ports of the Atlantic via the Tehuantepec Railway.
