

ERS IN U. S., 100 RECEIVE NOTICE TO APPEAR.

Charles W. Van Cleave, of the Na- Oregon. tional Manufacturers' Association today gave out a statement in which he asserts that out of 25,000 manufacturers in the United States only about 100 received notice to appear before the ways and means committee to give information regarding tariff revision. He asserts that not only were those invited given so short a notice that they could not prepare data, but questions put by leading members of the committee to these manufacturers who have appeared before the committee are calculated to call out answers asking for retension of present rates of duties or advances in them. He says that the questions are nearly always put "Do you not believe your present duties should be maintained?"
