PORTLAND, Dec. 1.—Stocks of apples in the Front street stores are still large and steadily increasing in size, despite the recent general cut in prices, and the question of what to do with the surplus, especially of varieties that are not keeping well, is proving a serious one with the wholesalers.

On the street today prices of \$1.50 to \$1.75 were exceptional, and quoted only where small lots of extra fancy Spitzenbergs or other unusually fine fruit were offered. The prices at which the bulk of the fruit moved ranged from 75 cents to \$1.25 a box, and medium to good apples of a dozen sorts were available at these quotations.

Onions and Potatoes Dull. There was nothing in the market today indicating any immediate improvement in the onion or potato trade, and current offerings in both lines are somewhat in excess of requirements, for the outside demand for the time amounts to little. Dealers generally are averse to paying more than 85 cents for potatoes, and they say they are plenty of onions just now available at 90 cents.

Poultry Market is Improving. While little business as yet has developed in the poultry trade this week, the outlook is more favorable than for some time back. Best hens and chickens were worth 11 to 12 cents today. There was no material change in ducks or geese, and there was practically no demand for turkeys.

Egg Market Decidedly Firm. A stronger feeling prevails in the egg market, both on local and Eastern products. On strictly fresh ranch eggs 40 cents is generally quoted and Easterns are held at 30 to 33 cents, according to quality, and the supply in both lines for the time is none too large.
