"Alameda, Cal., Dec. 14, 1908.

"I think so, too. I think the people to 'Statement No. 1' to stand by their pledge, but the question arises: 'Did the people have a choice?' That is he question I hear asked, and knowing, as all Oregonians know, how the nominations were made, it is hard to say that the people did have a choice. "Primaries were brought about where the people could vote, and le-

gally nominate their choice of candidates for the different offices, but left them the choice of nominating in the old way if that suited better, 'between two stools, one sits on the ground'-the democrats chose the old way for two reasons: First, they wanted to belittle the primary way of nominating, for it was a Republican Legislature that voted for it; second, in the nominations; as the Republimary method in the Legislature, could not very well go back on it at home.

"Now, I voted on the Republican side in the primaries, and I know that many Democrats voted in the Republican primaries, having registered as Republicans.

"Now, who was defeating the peoples' choice?
