The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, Dec. 29.—Whether the onion growers of this state will market their crop this season in the usual way, the individual producers acting for themselves, or dispose of the product as a whole through an agent, or agents, appointed by the federated growers, may be decided today.

Representatives of the Federated Onion Growers' Association from all districts where this crop is grown in a commercial way have arranged to meet in this city this afternoon, at the office of President Fanno of the association, to discuss the matter from all points of view and take final action on the scheme proposed for the disposition of the 1908 crop.

"There is no poultry market today," was the comment of a front-street dealer. "The turkeys are gone, and the demand also. We still have plenty of chickens, ducks and geese, but the retailers are not in the market to buy stuff that would have to be carried over to Monday, so there is nothing doing. For the time, I can see nothing to warrant any changes from the last quotations on any line."

Oregon ranch eggs were quoted at 40 to 42 cents on the street today, but in some quarters weakness was reported and some dealers held that it would be difficult to move even the moderate stocks on hand at better than 40 cents. Easterns still comprise the bulk of the supply.
