**OCEAN, BAR,  
BAY, DOCK  
AND RIVER**

The steamer R. Miller has been se-  
lected by the postal authorities here  
to carry the Lurline's mail matter  
hence to Brookfield, Altoona, Skamo-  
kawa and Cathlamet, until the former  
steamer resumes her run down this  
way, she being ice-bound at the me-  
tropolis just now, and likely to re-  
main there the better part of another  
week. We don't know just how this  
plan is going to work, as the Miller,  
which started for those up river ports  
yesterday, made it only as far as  
Buoy No. 2, and had to come back on  
account of the heavy ice.

At 5 o'clock afternoon, Operator  
"Fuzzy" Ferland, the accommodating  
agent for the United Wireless at its  
station on Smith's Point, got the fol-  
lowing weather news from the Cape  
Blanco station: "Overcast; misty to  
rain; stiff breeze blowing from the  
southeast; choppy sea; barometer, 29;  
20; and falling rapidly; temperature,  
40. He also picked up the oil steam-  
er Col. E. L. Drake, at 2:30 p. m.  
yesterday, 12 miles to the south of  
Cape Lookout, and making good  
headway toward San Francisco, from  
Seattle, with all well on board.

The I. R. Company's steamer Nab-  
cotta had a hard time of it yesterday  
bucking the shore ice on the north  
bank of the Columbia, but succeeded  
in making her way back to this side  
and in the afternoon went over again  
to Megler's.

The fine schooner Virginia, 42 days  
out from Molendo, Peru, entered port  
yesterday afternoon, with all well on  
board and an uneventful and fast trip  
up the two coasts. Late yesterday her  
master had not received his cargo or-  
ders, but they will reach him today.

The British steamship Tweeddale  
finished loading one million lath at  
the Hammond Lumbering Company's  
plant yesterday, and under pilotage of  
Captain George Wood, put to sea dur-  
ing the afternoon, for San Francisco.

The steamer Nome City was one  
of the arrivals in this port yesterday,  
from the Bay City, and after a short  
stay at the Callender, passed on up  
the river with Captain Al Betts, of  
the river pilot service on her bridge.

The oil tank steamer Asuncion ar-  
rived in from the California coast  
yesterday afternoon and went on up  
the river under the pilotage of Cap-  
tain Joe Turner. She is of steel and  
will probably get through without  
any trouble.
