Captain Parker came to the surface and finding himself free from the lines and gear, struck out for the bank, which he reached safely, and was assisted ashore; after which they secured a long branch, and with this he entered the river again and got the limb under the jaw of the animal and slowly guided it into the bank and finally got it back in the road.

The rig floated on down the river and they overtook it and by hard work recovered it and found that nothing was broken save the barness. This was temporarily repaired and the party proceeded on its way over the long bridge and down to the Erickson place, where a hot fire, some dry clothes, and a hearty meal helped to compensate for the untoward experience of the day.
