

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, Jan. 21.—That between 20 and 30 per cent of the potato crop of the state in the hands of farmers was lost as a consequence of the recent freeze is the opinion of one of the leading local dealers who has spent the greater part of the week investigating conditions in the various districts. He said today:

In onions the situation is much more favorable as regards crop damage by the freeze. The crop was more or less generally frozen, but onions are less susceptible to damage by frost than potatoes, and the chances are that the crop as a whole will be marketable.

Fish Supply is Running Low.

Bad weather and unfavorable conditions on the Columbia River and elsewhere have cut down the fish supply locally to the lowest point known in months. For the time the market is practically bare of fresh salmon, catfish, tom cod, smelt, crabs and razor clams.

Butter Weaker; Cheese Firm.

Butter prices in general held at yesterday's price level, but the tone of the market was materially weaker and the prospect is for a general decline in the near future. Cream supplies show a steady increase.

Cheese is firm and stocks of new make are for the time so light as to be of small consequence. Storage stocks are being heavily drawn upon and the demand for this is strong, though the bulk of the trade for the present is confined to this locality.

Poultry Plentiful and Easy.

Receipts of poultry generally were liberal and prices showed a slight downward trend as regards hens and chickens. In other lines there were no price changes, but the market was not strong.

Best Oregon eggs moved at 37 1/2 to 40 cents and unless arrivals prove heavier than are expected the chances are that there will be no further changes this week. The supply today was sufficient, but not much in excess of the demand.

Veal Lowered Half a Cent.

In country dressed meats the only change in the market was a slightly weaker feeling in veal, the best grade of which was lowered half a cent, or 10 cents a pound. Pork held its own at the last quotation. In both lines stocks were fully sufficient for the demand.
