PORTLAND, Jan. 28.—There is little doing in the hop market now, so far as the movement of the 1908 crop is concerned, and the situation is about the same as regards contracts. The week that followed the recent cold spell witnessed considerable activity in the trade. Orders for delivery early in the month had to be held up for a time on account of the weather, and when the change came there was something of a rush in the market and prices showed a slight upward trend. Now that most of the deliveries for the month have been executed, the market shows a quieter tone, with prices holding at the level of the past few weeks.

There has been some buying of scattering lots in various parts of the state this week, but the volume of the trade has been small and the bulk of the business at prices around 6 cents. Dealers today said that 74 cents represented the top of the market.

The Internal Revenue Bureau, for the second time in the course of a year, reports an increase in beer production for the month of December last over the figures for the same month in 1907. The report shows a total output for the month at 4,267,387 barrels, a gain of 101,411 barrels over the December output in 1907. In September of last year there was also a slight gain over the same month of 1907. In the other 10 of the past 12 months the returns showed losses. The report shows a total beer output for the country last year of 56,385,868 barrels, a decrease of 8,725,035 barrels from the production of 1907.

Delayed Truck Now Coming.
Carlot receipts from the South today included two cars of bananas and one each of sweet potatoes and mixed vegetables. Practically all the stuff was in good condition on arrival, and in view of the shortage of the past two weeks met with ready sale. Sweet potatoes were quoted firm at \$2.50 a hundred, and cabbage at \$3. There are at least a dozen other cars of Southern fruits and vegetables that were held up by washouts on the Southern Pacific, and most of them will probably be in within the next few days.

Oranges Firm; Apples Steady.
Fruit dealers report light stocks of oranges and a good demand at current quotations, and the prospect for little in the way of new supplies from the South for some time.

Apples are moving in a steady way and prices are well maintained. Stocks in the city have been greatly reduced within the past month, but here are considerable quantities yet to come in from the country. There is little likelihood of lower than present prices this season.

Butter Prices Unchanged.
The city creameries reported no change in prices today, and most of them regarded the market as fairly firm at 37 cents. There is no assurance of any consequence in any other.

These held firmly at yesterday's rates, and there was nothing in sight to indicate any weakening. The trade locally and both in the North and South continues active.

Egg Supply Still Meagre.
The local market was still short of today, with fresh Oregon quotations at 50 to 55 cents. Sales at even 60 were reported. Receipts were what heavier than yesterday, but supply was far from adequate. Considerable quantities of Eastern California eggs are on the way but the chances are that prices will not fall within the next few days.
