

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, Feb. 1.—Standard city creamery butter dropped today, but not to a uniform price, some of the local producers quoting 34 and others 35 cents a pound. The decline today, which had been expected, was due to a weaker condition generally in the butter trade of the coast. The Sound markets have for some time been carrying heavy supplies of Eastern butter, and at the same time the San Francisco market has declined. Cream supplies in this state, while still limited, show an increase over the past two months.

At the prices effective today butter is selling materially lower than a year ago, when the price throughout the first two months of the year held at 37 1/2 cents a pound. At this time in 1907 the price was the same, while the 1906 quotation on standard city creamery at this date was 32 1/2c. The break in the egg market which was predicted for this week has not yet materialized, and there is a possibility that values will hold around the present level throughout the week. Receipts of Easterns and Californias for the day were light and while offerings of Oregon were heavier than on Saturday supplies from all sources were not sufficient to weaken the market in any serious way, and 50 cents a dozen was the generally quoted price in the wholesale trade.

Smelt sold at 3 cents a pound in the wholesale market today, dealers reporting liberal arrivals from the Cowlitz river. The supply of other fish was about the same as last week and there were no changes in prices.
