The break in the egg market which was predicted for this week has not yet materialized, and there is a poasibility that values will hold around the present level throughout the week. Receipts of Easterns and Calheavier than on Saturday supplies from all sources were not sufficient to weaken the market in any serious generally quoted price in the wholesale trade.

Smelt sold at 3 cents a pound in the wholesale market today, dealers reporting liberal arrivals from the Cowlitz river. The supply of other fish was about the same as last week and there were no changes in prices.
