QUARANTINING STOCK.

Nursery Plants To Be Rigidly Investigated Before Admission.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 -- A measure important to the farmers of the country as well as nurserymen. has been favorably acted upon by the House committee on agriculture yesterday, Representative Scott of Kansas, Chairman of the committee is author of the bill-

It provides for government inspection of nursery stock at ports of entry to be designated by the Secre tary of Agriculture. An appropriation* of \$100,000 is carried by the biff which authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to organize a quarantine against the importation or transportation in interstate commerce, of diseased nursery stock or stock invested with injurious insects.


