# The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, Feb. 16.—Late reports from many sections of the Inland Empire indicate that the wheat crop prospect for the current year was never better than now, and in the event nothing from this time or occurs to cause damage to the growing grain the outlook is for a wheat yield fully the equal of that of two years ago, if not even greater.

Big Salmon Run Expected. Mail advices from the North say of prospective salmon fishing operations on the Fraser River, British Columbia: "This year the big run of salmon is expected and the traps and canneries will be working full time. Reports from the Fraser River state that every canner will be in operation, but that the Dominion government will not allow dismantled canneries to operate, and new licenses are being granted. The estimated number that will be in operation in that locality is 40. All the northern canneries will also be in full swing and on Vancouver Island it is understood that the traps will be much more numerous than they have been for three years past."

Vegetable Trade is Good. Practically everything in the vegetable line moved actively today and prices held up well on all lines. Cabbage was especially firm, the best Los Angeles product going at \$3.25 to \$3.50 a hundred. Celery sold at \$4.50 a crate and cauliflower around \$2.

Butter Active; Cheese Firm. Some of the city creameries report the current production of butter short of actual requirements, and there is no material surplus of either city or country creamery in any quarter.

In the cheese market there is for the time little or nothing available beyond storage stocks and these are being rapidly reduced. Prices are firmly maintained and it will be several weeks before liberal supplies of new make will be available.

Eggs Down Another Notch. Front street dealers today quoted Oregon eggs at 25 to 27 cents a dozen, and what the price will be by the end of the week is a matter of conjecture. In all quarters stocks are accumulating, for the demand is not strong enough to take up the steadily increasing receipts from the country.

Poultry, on the other hand, was firm and active in all lines, and if the supply continues light the chances are for some improvement in prices within the next few days.
