

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, March 3.—Potato dealers report the growers generally firm in their views of the future and in no hurry to sell at current quotations, and it is understood that slightly higher than quoted prices have been offered for choice stock in the country within the past few days. The demand in the South seems to be improving slowly. The local trade continues moderate in volume, with \$1.25 generally the top quotation.

Poultry Trade Still Active.
Dealers today reported a fair demand for all classes of poultry, particularly for chickens and ducks, but with little or no chance from the quotations of the past few days. Arrivals for the day were about sufficient for the demand.

Under pressure of heavy receipts, veal continues a trifle weak and the outlook is for lower prices in the near future. Pork held up firmly today and offerings generally were short of the needs of the trade.

Little Cheese in the Market.
New cheese as yet cuts but a small figure in the trade, and stocks of storage products are practically exhausted. The result is a very firm market at the higher prices that went into effect this week.

Butter production is steadily though slowly increasing, but the current output is still short of requirements and the market remains firm. Dealers look for a decline, though perhaps, a slight one, before the end of this month.

Salmon Supply Is Very Light.
Since the close of the salmon fishing season on the Columbia river the first of the month stocks in the local market have been steadily dwindling, until now they are all but exhausted. Dealers look for light offerings from the Willamette and Clackamas rivers, for under the law fishing in those streams is permitted until March 15. There were no changes in prices, either of salmon or other fish, today, but smelt are becoming scarce and the price may be raised before the end of the week.

Egg Market Well Maintained.
The egg market was steady to firm today, the result of lighter shipments from the country and a good general demand. It is believed that considerable quantities of Oregon eggs are now being sent by shippers direct to the Sound, for the local receipts thus far this week have been materially lighter than those of last week. On the street today 24 to 25 cents a dozen was quoted, and at these figures there was no complaint of inability to sell.
