PORTLAND, March 8.—Receipts of fruit and vegetables from the South for the two days include three cars of bananas, three of mixed vegetables, two of oranges and one each of celery and sweet potatoes.

One of the leading local egg dealers said today: "Receipts for the day last week promise to be fairly large; far as we know there is just now an outlet on the Sound for our products; thus far today we have not had inquiry for eggs from the local side; the retailers do not seem disposed to buy; it is known that Eastern eggs in considerable quantities will be in the city soon.
