

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, March 12.—Though dealers' views on egg values varied somewhat today, the range being from 20 to 22 cents, there was general agreement in the belief that the market is steadily weakening, and a drop to below 20 cents within the next few days would cause no surprise. Receipts continue heavy, and there is not the outlet on the Sound now that there was a week ago. Consequently stocks are piling up in most of the stores and retailers are still buying in a cautious way. The chance is that storage operations will be undertaken to some extent in the near future.

Bermuda Onions Coming Soon.
Reports from the South received by local brokers today announced that carlot shipments of Texas Bermuda onions would be ready for the market by March 15, and that offerings for the same commodity from Southern California would be available about the first of April. The Texas crop this year is said to be about the same as that of 1908, while the California output will be approximately 50 per cent short. The prices at which these opinions will move in this market are as yet a matter of uncertainty, but it is believed that they will be about the same as those of a year ago.
