

# The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, March 16.—High prices and strong demand prevail on Front street for fruits and vegetables of all kind, and farmers who have anything to dispose of need not worry over selling it.

**Eggs Are Plentiful.**  
Fresh eggs are quoted at 20 cents along Front street this morning, and an absence of demand from Puget Sound and Spokane had a tendency to depress prices. Cold storage men are not willing to put eggs by for winter use until the produce gets down to 18 cents or below, and this waiting on their part further tends to full stocks on hand, to be worked off within the week. A carload of Easterns, ordered by a big retail house, still inclines the market to unsettled conditions, as the Eastern eggs will probably be offered a few cents a dozen less than the home product.

**California Vegetables.**  
A goodly shipment of California vegetables is expected by the steamer due from San Francisco today, and a heavy demand awaits them. A carload of Imperial Valley cabbage is

being got up for this market, and this is expected to sell at 4 cents a pound. The Oregon cabbage has nearly all disappeared and what is left is selling at 3 cents.
