DENVER, March 20.—The Rocky Mountain News says:

Whatever hopes some people may have had that horse racing and book-making would be legalized in Colorado have been blasted by Governor Shafroth. The governor has emphatically stated to several persons who have sounded him on the subject that no matter what bill legalizing race track gambling is passed, it will be vetoed.

So plain did the governor make himself on this point that a bill introduced in the House will never come out of committee. The bill in question permits racing and betting at any fair or association exhibiting stock and produce.
