

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, March 20.—There will be little if any poultry to be carried over into next week. Receipts for the week were but moderate and the demand was sufficient to take everything that came, even turkeys, for which there is usually but little call at this time of the year, moving quite freely.

In eggs there was no change from the conditions of yesterday. Shipments from Valley points to the city this week were heavy, but the demands in the North kept the decks reasonably clear.

Drop in Butter Predicted.
Predictions of a decline in butter next week were heard on the street today. For the present conditions locally would rather warrant an advance, for some of the city makers still report inability to fill orders, but the California market shows weakness and heavy shipments from that state in the near future are among the possibilities.

Potato Growers Are Bullish.
Offers of \$1.50 for fancy potatoes and the few purchases that have been made from growers at that figure within the past few days have developed a very bullish feeling among the growers, according to reports on the street today. The producers are confident that spuds will go to at least \$1.75, and perhaps \$2.00, in the near future, on the strength of the present California demand, and for the time they are little disposed to let go at even \$1.50.

Cabbage in Liberal Supply.
There was plenty of California cabbage on the street today, and the stuff was quoted at \$2.75 to \$3.00 a hundred. Cauliflower supplies were light and the last prices were maintained. It was reported today that the last car of California celery for the season would be in within a few days. This commodity held firmly at \$4.50 a crate today. Sweet potatoes moved in a fair way at \$2.50 to \$2.75 a hundred.
